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**Tabulations From a Survey of California Likely Voters  
About Props. 1A, 1B, 1C, 1D, 1E, and 1F on the  
May Special Election Ballot**

## **Introduction**

This volume presents the statistical data developed from a *Field Poll* survey of likely voters in the upcoming May 19<sup>th</sup> special election in California. Topics covered included voter awareness, preferences and understanding of the various ballot measures. The survey was conducted by *The Field Poll* is an independent and non-partisan survey of California public opinion, with additional grant funding provided by the California HealthCare Foundation to add questions proving voter knowledge of the health-related ballot measures and their likely impact on the state budget.

The results contained in this report are based on a *Field Poll* survey completed among a representative sample of 901 registered voters in California, 422 of whom can be considered likely voters in the upcoming May 19 special statewide election. All interviewing was conducted April 16-26, 2009 by telephone in English and Spanish. The total bases shown in these statistical tabulations are weighted bases and differ slightly from the actual number of 422 likely voter interviews conducted. In order to cover a broad range of issues and still minimize possible voter fatigue, some of the questions were asked of a random subsample of registered voters statewide.

## **Sampling**

The sample was developed from telephone listings of individual voters selected randomly from a listing of statewide voter registration rolls. Once a voter's name and telephone had been selected interviewers are attempted only with the specified voter. Interviews can be conducted on either the voter's landline or cell phone, depending on the source of the telephone listing from the voter file. For this survey, the sample was stratified so as to yield interviews with approximately equal numbers of Democrats and Republicans. After the completion of interviewing, the results were weighted to return this disproportionate sample allocation to the actual distribution of registered voters by party and by various other demographic and regional characteristics of the state's registered voter population.

## **Data Collection**

Prior to the start of data collection, professionally-trained telephone interviewers were briefed with regard to the survey's proper calling and interviewing procedures by the Study Director. This session provided both interviewers and supervisors with an overview of the study and includes a question-by-question review of all items in the survey. Interviewers then completed all survey interviews by telephone through the computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) system. CATI controls the telephone scripts read to individual respondents by displaying the appropriate questionnaire items and their valid response code alternatives in their proper sequence on computer screens at each interviewer's booth. The interviewer then reads each question aloud to the respondent from the screen and enters each respondent's pre-coded answer category through the keyboard directly to a computer disk. All answers are automatically stored in computer memory.

In order to bring hard-to-reach respondents into the survey, up to six attempts (an initial call plus five callbacks) were made to each telephone number selected for inclusion into the sample. Callbacks were made at different times and on different days to increase the probability of finding voters available for the interview. Where possible, appointments are made at specified dates and times to maximize convenience and cooperation rates.

## **Data Processing**

Because CATI itself provides for the direct data entry of responses by the interviewer and does not permit ineligible or invalid data entries, the data file resulting from CATI interviewing is itself virtually error-free. Following this, a final series of data checks were performed by means of a specially designed cleaning program that scrutinizes each respondent record for internally inconsistent information. Once the data were determined to be clean and error-free, the sample was weighted slightly to align it to known estimates of the demographic and regional characteristics of the state's registered voter population. Please note that the bases shown throughout the tabulations in this report are weighted bases and differ slightly from the actual number of respondents interviewed within each subgroup.

## **Guide to Reading the Tables**

The following is an explanation of the detailed statistical tabulations contained in this report:

- The question or questions upon which the data are based is shown at the top of each table
- Tables are percentaged vertically with the raw percentage base appearing at the top of each column.
- The data have been weighted to known parameters of the statewide registered voter population. All percentages and frequencies reported in each table are therefore weighted tabulations.
- In instances where percentages are calculated on small bases (e.g., when the base is fewer than 100 respondents) the reader is urged to interpret the data with caution, since results are subject to relatively large levels of sampling error.
- Throughout the tables an asterisk is used to denote a value of less than 1/2 of 1%. A hyphen indicates zero value. On some tables the percentages may add to more than 100% due to multiple mentions.
- Bases of subgroups used in the tabulations may add to less than the total number of respondents due to some respondents not reporting that characteristic.

## Subgroup Definitions

The following are some of the definitions applicable to some of the voter subgroups reported in this volume:

### Area

Southern California: Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, Imperial, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Kern, and San Luis Obispo counties

Northern California: all other 48 California counties

Coastal Counties: San Diego, Orange, Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo, Monterey, Santa Cruz, San Mateo, San Francisco, Contra Costa, Alameda, Marin, Napa, Solano, Sonoma, Santa Clara, Mendocino, Humboldt and Del Norte counties

Inland counties: all other 38 California counties

### Region

Los Angeles: Los Angeles County

San Diego/Orange: San Diego County and Orange counties

Other South: San Bernardino, Riverside, Imperial, Ventura, Santa Barbara, and San Luis Obispo

SF Bay Area: San Francisco, Marin, Napa, Sonoma, Solano, Contra Costa, Alameda, Santa Clara, San Mateo

Central Valley: Butte, Colusa, Fresno, Glenn, Kern, Kings, Madera, Merced, Placer, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Shasta, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehema, Tulare, Yolo, and Yuba

Other North: Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, Del Norte, El Dorado, Humboldt, Inyo, Lake, Lassen, Mariposa, Mendocino, Monterey, Modoc, Mono, Nevada, Plumas, San Benito, Santa Cruz, Sierra, Siskiyou, Trinity, and Tuolumne

### Estimates of Sampling Error

In any survey based on a sampling, there is some sampling error introduced into the data by the process of sampling itself. When the sample has been drawn using random processes, it is possible to apply probability principles to determine the potential range of such error. While survey samples of human populations rarely, if ever, meet all of the criteria theoretically required for the application of these principles, it is customary to use them as an approximation of error that is introduced as a result of sampling. The table below shows the range of error that is associated with samples of various sizes, assuming the use of the 95% confidence level, which is customary for most public opinion surveys.

For example, if 50% of a sample of overall sample of 422 likely voters answered “yes” to a specific question, this statistic would have a sampling error of plus or minus 4.9 percentage points at the 95% confidence level. This means that there is a 95% chance that had the overall population of registered voters statewide been interviewed using the same questionnaire and methods, the results of such a census would yield a result between 45.1 % and 54.9%. The same procedure can be used to estimate the sample error ranges of any other statistic contained in this report.

There are many other possible sources of error other than sampling variability in this and any other public opinion survey. Different results could occur because of differences in question wording, sequencing, the rigor with which sampling procedures were implemented, or through undetected errors or omissions in sampling, interviewing or data processing. The overall design and execution of the survey minimized the potential for these other sources of error.

## Questions Asked

Have you seen, read or heard anything about the six budget-related ballot measures, Propositions 1A through 1F, that will appear on the May 19 special election ballot?

I am going to read the descriptions of these six ballot propositions, and for each please tell me whether you would vote Yes or No if the election were being held today. The first measure is Proposition 1A, the Rainy Day Budget Stabilization Fund. It changes the budget process and could limit future deficits and spending by increasing the size of the state 'rainy day' fund and requiring above-average revenues to be deposited into it for use during economic downturns and other purposes. Fiscal Impact: Higher state tax revenues of roughly 16 billion dollars from 2010 through 2012, with increased rainy day reserve and potentially fewer ups and downs in state spending over time. If the election were being held today, would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1A?

If Prop. 1A is approved, how likely do you think it is that it will be successful in limiting the size of future state budget deficits – very likely, somewhat likely, not too likely or not at all likely?

If Prop. 1A is approved, how likely do you think it is that it will be successful in slowing the rate of growth in future state spending – very likely, somewhat likely, not too likely or not at all likely?

Please tell me if you believe the following statement about Prop. 1A is true or not. “If Prop. 1A is approved it will extend for up to two years recent increases in the state sales tax, vehicle registration fee and income tax.” In your opinion is this statement true or not true?

The second ballot measure is Proposition 1B, the Education Funding, Payment Plan Act. It requires supplemental payments to local school districts and community colleges to address recent budget cuts. Fiscal Impact: Potential state savings of up to several billion dollars in 2009 and 2010, and potential state costs of billions of dollars annually thereafter. If the election were being held today would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1B?

Please tell me if you believe the following statement about Prop. 1B is true or not: “Even if voters approve Prop.1B, it won’t take effect unless Prop. 1A is also approved.” In your opinion is this statement true or not true?

The third ballot measure is Proposition 1C, the Lottery Modernization Act. It modernizes the state lottery to improve its performance with increased payouts and improved marketing and management. It requires the state to maintain lottery ownership and authorizes additional accountability measures. It protects school funding levels provided by lottery revenues. Increased lottery revenues will be used to address the budget deficit and reduce the need for additional tax increases and cuts to state programs. Fiscal Impact: Allows 5 billion dollars of borrowing from future lottery profits to help balance the 2009 state budget. Debt service payments would likely make it more difficult to balance future state budgets. If the election were being held today would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1C?

If Prop. 1C is approved, how likely do you think it is that the changes made to the state lottery will significantly increase its future earnings – very likely, somewhat likely, not too likely or not at all likely?

The fourth ballot measure is Proposition 1D, the Children's Services Funding Act. It temporarily provides greater flexibility in funding to preserve health and human services for young children while helping balance the state budget in a difficult economy. Fiscal Impact: State General Fund savings of up to 608 million dollars in 2009 and 268 million dollars from 2010 through 2013. Corresponding reductions in funding for early childhood development programs provided by the California Children and Families Program. If the election were being held today, would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1D?

Please tell me if you believe the following statement about Prop. 1D is true or not: “Prop. 1D would change the way the state funds health and human service programs for children from what had been approved by voters in a previous ballot initiative, Proposition 10 in 1998.” In your opinion is this statement true or not true?

If Prop. 1D is approved, do you think it will increase or reduce the total amount that the state spends on health and human service programs over the next four years or will funding on health and human service programs remain about the same?

The fifth ballot measure is Proposition 1E, the Mental Health Funding. Temporary Reallocation Act. It helps balance the state budget by amending the Mental Health Services Act (Proposition 63 of 2004) to transfer funds for two years to pay for mental health services provided through the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment Program for children and young adults. Fiscal Impact: General Fund savings of about 230 million dollars annually for two years. Corresponding reduction in funding available for Mental Health Services Act programs. If the election were being held today, would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1E?

If Prop. 1E is approved, do you think it will increase or reduce the total amount that the state spends on mental health programs over the next two years or will funding on mental health programs remain about the same?

The sixth ballot measure is Proposition 1F, the Elected Officials' Salaries and Prevents Pay Increases During Budget Deficit Years Act. It encourages balanced state budgets by preventing elected members of the legislature and statewide constitutional officers from receiving pay raises in years when the state is running a deficit. Fiscal impact: Minor state savings related to elected state officials' salaries when the state expects to end the year with a budget deficit. If the election were being held today would you vote YES or NO on Proposition 1F?

Please tell me if you agree or disagree with each of the following statements... (ITEMS READ IN RANDOM ORDER, ASKING:) If the measures on the special election ballot are defeated, it would make the state's budget problems even worse by increasing the size of the deficit by about six billion dollars. If the measures on the special election ballot are defeated, it would send a message to the governor and the state legislature that voters are tired of more government. Do you agree strongly, agree somewhat disagree somewhat or disagree strongly?
